Family Educational Services Foundation (FESF) is a charitable organization committed to education and social impact in Pakistan. We focus on the empowerment of disadvantaged deaf children and youth through a holistic approach to deaf education, skills training, job placement, and sign language development – creating lasting change in their lives and that of their families.

OUR VALUES

Zakat donations are collected and utilized under the supervision of Alhamd Shariah Advisory Services Pvt. Ltd. under a 3-member committee headed by Mufti Ibrahim Essa. Zakat funds are kept in a separate Shariah compliant bank account and expensed according to Shariah guidelines.

Approved U/S 2(36) (c) of the Income Tax Ordinance 2001, read with I.T. rule 214 and 220 of tax rules 2002. FESF financials are audited by Deloitte Yousuf & Adil Chartered Accountants & Co.

FESF is honored to be a consultative member of the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), and part of a select number of organizations that are helping to formulate and implement programs in support of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) - both in Pakistan and globally.

In line with government policy, FESF is a registered organization with Pakistan Centre for Philanthropy (PCP).

FESF is a member of the National Literacy Coalition and has consultative status to advise on matters related to Deaf education.

FOUNDER'S NOTE: ADAPTING TO A NEW REALITY

The following quote holds great significance for this year's update

"Great challenges are a catalyst for great changes"

As the year began we were on track with our annual goals when suddenly the world changed – and we found ourselves needing to re-strategize and adapt to a new reality as we confronted the impact of the pandemic on our students and schools.

Deaf children are one of the most vulnerable groups within the disability sector. The majority belong to low-income families and are highly marginalized, often deprived of education and language development. These families frequently lack access to basic utilities and struggle to meet essential needs, especially during this pandemic.

The initial lockdowns resulted in job loss and reduced income for many. Your swift support made it possible to provide full food packages for 5 months to all our deaf students and their families across the 7 Deaf Reach Schools. Additionally, we were able to retain all of our teachers and staff members, keeping them on full salary in spite of the difficult circumstances.

A primary goal was to find a way to continue our students' education and prevent erosion of their language skills. The majority of deaf children live in isolation, as their family members are not usually fluent in sign language, and they miss the nurturing environment of their school peer group.

To meet these great needs, we developed and launched the Distance Learning Program. A digitized curriculum in sign language covering the academic content for all grade levels was filmed in-house, loaded on donated low-cost laptops, and a device given to each student. This valuable digital curriculum will also be available online for access by schools, teachers, and families of deaf children nationwide.

The Eduserve program had a full calendar schedule of live training programs and events planned. Suddenly, a year of hard work was suspended and the uncertainty was a challenge to navigate. The team adapted to the new environment and shifted the training courses to digital platforms resulting in greater student collaboration and successfully reaching new communities that previously had been untouched.

Covid-19 is an undeniable reality for the foreseeable future, but having learned and acclimated thus far, we will continue to adapt to ensure the ongoing care of those whom we serve. As 2021 ushers in uncertainty regarding when, or if, schools will reopen and any kind of "normal" will return, we are counting on your continued support to sustain the many years of hard work that have brought us this far.

Deaf Reach

According to recent demographics in Pakistan there are over one million deaf children, yet less than 5% of these have access to education!

Deaf Reach is one of the only branch networks of schools for the Deaf in Pakistan reaching out into rural areas, and is continually expanding its programs to further empower marginalized urban and rural deaf youth, the majority of whom are economically challenged, to provide them a brighter future.

The program's innovative and holistic approach focuses on education and skills training for deaf children and youth; development of teachers and interpreters; Pakistan Sign Language programs for parents and communities; advocacy; job placement; and the creation of educational resources for the Deaf.

Adapting to a New Reality: COVID 19 Response Activities

Ration Program

Deaf Reach provided a monthly basic food basket of Rs. 5,000 value to our 1,200+ Deaf students and their families, as well as more than 100 of our lower income staff and their families for 5 months. The majority of these live in rural villages and katchi abadi areas.

Operational Changes At Deaf Reach

All our teachers have been retained and continue to work at their respective campus in developing digital content for the Distance Learning Program. They are also staying in touch with each of the students to assist them with their school work while schools are closed down.

Information And Awareness Content For The Deaf Community

Deaf Reach has been creating timely and important health and hygiene information available in sign language for the Deaf community across Pakistan who are often excluded from accessing news channels and other social platforms. Working with both the Governments of Sindh and Punjab, Deaf Reach created a series of short informational videos in sign language for understanding Covid-19. Local channels have continued to broadcast these videos, reaching the Deaf community nationwide.

Partner With TCF Teleschool

Deaf Reach partnered with The Citizens Foundation (TCF) in their weekly Ilm ka Aagan and Suno Kahani telecast on PTV's TeleSchool channel, making educational content accessible to the Deaf so they can learn alongside their hearing peers.

Basic Utility Survey

We conducted a survey to assess the availability of basic facilities among households of students enrolled in our school system. Data collected is guiding the plan.

ACTIVITIES AT DEAF REACH

Deaf Reach Collaborates with Sindh Gov't

Expansion of the outreach and impact of Deaf Reach Schools across Sindh was enabled by a grant-in-aid from the Sindh Gov't, making school more accessible for deaf children, particularly in outlying rural areas. Deaf Reach also serves as a consultant to the Sindh Gov't in matters pertaining to assistive services for special needs children. We extend our heartfelt thanks and appreciation for this ongoing support!











Driving Licenses for the Deaf

The Sindh Assembly passed a landmark bill paving the way for deaf persons to be given driving licenses – a first in Pakistan – and the result of advocacy by FESF and other organizations working for persons with disabilities. Deaf people in Sindh will now be able to commute for jobs, education, health care and improve their quality of life.

CISCO Humanitarian Hero Award

Mr. Ovais Iqbal, Director Systems Engineering at CISCO, a global technology conglomerate, was appointed in 2019 as Deaf Reach's Good Will Ambassador for North America.

With 80,000 CISCO employees watching from 92 countries around the world, the CISCO CEO proudly announced Ovais as the winner of their Global Community Hero Award to honor his work in support of FESF's Deaf Reach Program in Pakistan.





Golf Tournament 2020

Defence Authority Country & Golf Club hosted the 5th Charity Golf Tournament in support of Deaf Reach in Karachi on 8th March, 2020.

KFC was the platinum sponsor as over 80 avid golfers played and 25 companies partnered for a successful tournament. The luncheon ceremony was closed with a touching performance by young deaf students of the famous song, "Sonhi Dharti."

First Lady hands over AC Vans to Deaf Reach

The First Lady, Mrs. Samina Alvi, handed over four air conditioner units donated by Thal Engineering and fitted into school vans of the Deaf Reach network.

Deaf Reach provides pick and drop for all its students across its 7 campuses up to a 50 km radius, and this contribution will make the children's commute more pleasant, especially in the summer heat.





Pakistan Super League - PSL

After many years, cricket returned to the Karachi grounds in all its glory. Millions of viewers worldwide watched our deaf young heroes accompany the international team owners on stage for the opening ceremony as they took the oath, which was interpreted simultaneously in Pakistan Sign Language (PSL) by our students.

New Lahore Deaf Reach Campus

FESF signed a MoU with the Social Welfare Dept, Govt of Punjab for the space utilization of a building located in the Social Welfare Complex in Township, Lahore to establish a Deaf Reach School, College and Training Center with capacity for 200 deaf children.

The founder of Packages Group, Syed Babar Ali, supported the renovation and setting up of a state-of-the-art facility for deaf education through his foundation.











"Help Me Solve It" session at Wise 2019 Summit, Doha

As 2018 winners of the award, FESF hosted a session at WISE 2019 Summit in Doha, Qatar to commemorate the 10 year anniversary of WISE.

Since its inception in 2009, WISE received more than 4,500 applications from over 150 countries. To date, only 72 projects have been awarded.





Pakistan Poverty Alleviation Fund (PPAF) Partners with Deaf Reach

We are grateful to PPAF for their capacity building support of Deaf Reach. They also arranged for representatives of a dozen organizations from FATA, KPK and Baluchistan to visit our school campus in Karachi to better understand our Deaf Reach model.

THE DISTANCE LEARNING PROGRAM

Due to Covid – 19 school closures, deaf children became increasingly vulnerable and at a risk of losing out on their education and language retention. To meet this challenge, we implemented the Distance Learning Program (DLP), which provides digital curricular content in sign language to our out-of-school students for all grades 1 – 12 across four core subjects: Math, Science, English, and Urdu.

Deployment

All Deaf Reach students received donor-sponsored refurbished laptops on which to view the materials, and follow a monthly lesson plan supplemented by worksheets and a daily study calendar. Each month parents and students visit their Deaf Reach campus on designated days to discuss their children's progress, troubleshoot any challenges, and receive their new content for the coming month.



End Results

It has been heartening to see our students able to continue on their educational pathway in spite of the difficulties. We look forward to posting all the sign language content online, making it accessible nationwide to the Deaf community and their families, as well as to teachers and schools for the Deaf.









NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND CASE STUDY ON LATE LEARNERS

Muhammad Siddique is a 14 yr. old deaf boy, currently enrolled at the Deaf Reach School in Sukkur, Pakistan. He resides in Lakhi Ghulam Shah, a small village in district Shikarpur, Sindh. His father, Abdul Ghaffar Soomro, earns his living by teaching the Quran and is the sole breadwinner to support his family of seven. Muhammad Siddique is one of five siblings and is the only deaf member in his household.

Deafness is hereditary in Muhammad's maternal family with many of his relatives having hearing loss, and Muhammad has been deaf from birth. Belonging to a low-income family, Muhammad's father struggled to educate all of his children. Not only was it difficult to afford education, it was nearly impossible to find an institution catering to the needs of his deaf son.

For Muhammad, watching his siblings and friends attend school also sparked an interest in doing the same. He longed to go to school and would often accompany his father to the Madrasah. His father recalls the days when Muhammad would repeatedly ask to be taught what his friends were learning but due to the language barrier he would fail to understand the lesson. He watched his son's frustration and felt helpless that he could not teach him due to his own inability to communicate with him in a meaningful way. Discovering Deaf Reach School was a blessing for the entire family. Muhammad had lost precious years of early learning and his family was delighted to find a school that provided an accelerator program for other deaf students like him. Currently, Muhammad Siddique is enrolled in the Basic Education and Skills Training (BEST) Program at Deaf Reach School, Sukkur. The program, focusing on the No Child Left Behind principle, has made it possible for Muhammad to study in an environment tailored to his learning needs and where all his teachers and peers use sign language.

Muhammad's father is proud of how his son has improved since joining the school. Muhammad can now sign fluently and express himself, and is flourishing academically. He is now more confident and does not hesitate before taking part in discussions. He can freely communicate with those around him and uses Pakistan Sign Language (PSL) to convey his viewpoint. His father, Abdul, is also learning sign language by attending the Parent Training classes held two times a month and is overjoyed that he can now communicate with his son. Muhammad's enthusiasm is intense when he speaks about Deaf Reach. After years of feeling left out he is excited to have received the opportunity to attend school and is eager to learn and experience all that he can. When asked about his future, Muhammad looks forward to pursuing his love of engineering when he grows up.

Overall, joining Deaf Reach has been a highly positive experience for Muhammad Siddique. Not only has he progressed academically but is now part of a community where he can continue to learn and grow in his pathway to self-reliance.

Motivated Volunteer Empowerment Program (MOVE)

MOVE is an innovative 'service learning' program for youth, aged 14 to 25. It provides skills, knowledge and an opportunity to take positive social action. Young people work together to analyze problems in the community, brainstorm solutions, fundraise, manage a budget and develop and implement a Social Action Project (SAP).

EduServe developed the AeN curriculum, supervised the training implementation, and conducted a 12 days 'Train the Trainer' program for **28 trainers** and co-trainers. Trainers for Arts and Culture conducted modules on 'Arts for Social Change', 'Personality Development through Visual Arts', and 'Music and Theatre for Social Change' for **1641 youth participants**. Participants then used theatre, music and visual arts in the implementation of **23 Social Action Projects** to reach their community with messages of peace, inclusion, mental health and general awareness.

During COVID-19, youth participants implemented SAP's online which included Facebook live talks, zoom sessions, and they created photo essay competitions and general COVID related awareness videos.
